**‘The Lord bless you and keep you;
the Lord make his face shine on you and be gracious to you;
the Lord turn his face toward you and give you peace.’**

Numbers 6: 22-27 was the sermon text for Trinity Sunday, the Sunday after the General Assembly week. It is called the Aaronitic Blessing and it is used in churches throughout the world on Sunday when we send people out into the world. When we go from our place of worship, our Christian home, into this world which we sometimes find more and more scary and strange to us and God’s will.

Several people asked me to publish this sermon, so that those who were not able to be in church on Sunday could read it. It was preached on Trinity Sunday and the Trinity of our God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit was apparent throughout the service and the prayers. However in the Trinity Sunday’s morning service I had to preach about a Pentecost miracle, because Pentecost happened again during this week and Ian Bulloch will not have been able to tell you this story on the Sunday of Pentecost because it only happened during the following week. – But it is so important and concerns all of us all and that is why I have to share this with you.

Pentecost is all about the coming of the Holy Spirit into this world. I am always a bit uneasy about the Holy Spirit. Well, no, I am not uneasy about the Holy Spirit himself but about what we might mistake for the work of the Holy Spirit, about the task of discerning the Holy Spirit.

In the early years of the reformation there was a lot of violent upheaval and terrible atrocities happened in the name of religion, not dissimilar from what we see in the world today. In the town called Münster radicals founded a kind of Taliban type Christian state and the crimes committed there in the name of God were just horrendous. The people there relied completely on the guidance of what they thought was the voice of the Holy Spirit and the leaders said the Spirit had told them to do these things. The situation became so bad that the emperor’s and Protestant forces joined to make an end with this terrible dictatorship. Since then we Protestants in that part of the world are very wary about any kind of sectarianism and very careful about what *we think* is the Holy Spirit speaking to us.

The bible is the ultimate standard to discern the Spirit or other voices we might hear. We know how Jesus was tempted by the devil and combated him with the bible. But then he was Jesus – he *knew* it was the devil speaking to him. But we find it difficult to identify whose voice it is we hear and how to read our holy texts, how to discern God’s will which he left us in his Holy Word in the bible, a complex book, written by so many people to whom God revealed his will at different times and in so many different ways.

So when last year’s Moderator, the Very Rev Albert Bogle, told us members of the General Assembly on Saturday that when we had to vote on difficult matters we should listen to the little voice in our heads, I became very uneasy. And this uneasiness grew during Sunday night. I became a victim of nightmares and doubts. I had studied the bible, read the reports and prayed about it. I was pretty sure that my opinion was right and God’s will. But what if I was wrong?! We have certainty of salvation but not certainty of faith! We don’t have the certainty that our faith and our views and opinions are right. And with the bible there is always another text which might challenge your understanding.

When I walked up the Royal Mile on Monday morning I was so nervous, I had to put my iPod on. On this jiggle setting because I wasn’t able to choose the music I needed for this day, the Cure started singing: “I don’t care if Monday’s black...” But I did care! I did care so much. And I think we all did. It was yes or no to a decision which would hurt so many people on either side. No solution in sight. A situation nobody really wanted but nothing anybody could do about it.

And then it happened: Pentecost! Albert Bogle stood up and moved a countermotion to the two proposals still on the table, which he had just stitched up quickly over lunch. In his speech he said when he came in the morning he had no idea that he would move this. For he really didn’t want gay ministers in the church. He thought this was not God’s will for the church. But he also said that he might be wrong. And in all this doubt he was sure about one thing: that God’s will for the Church was unity and he, Albert, felt it was more important that the church would have unity than to stand by his position. And he moved that the church might maintain her traditional position on this issue but also allow those congregations who disagree to call a minister who is in a civil partnership. A miracle was happening! Somebody in the church said: I am sure about my position – but still, I might be wrong! And he moved – and what a big move this was for Albert!

And then we heard the Seconder to this motion, moved, almost in tears, saying that he never thought he would ever support such a thing but now he was seconding it and begging, literally begging the General Assembly to agree to this. He had not thought that there could still be a place for him the Church of Scotland. But now he saw it. And he begged us to make it possible for him to stay. And later Albert said: “I want to get there with you but I need a bit more time!”

And the General Assembly decided to do exactly this. To follow this proposal. To stick to her traditional position but to allow congregations to opt out of this. The Gordian knot had been cut. **Nobody left the church!** There was the way forward in unity. This Monday the Kirk made a decision which preserves its unity. We were on the verge of a split; it had been ever so close. The evil spirits had already worked for the last four years and we on our own account wouldn't have been able to find a way out. We needed the Holy Spirit and his guidance and he came.

And you know, the miracle that happened this Monday was not only that the church's unity was preserved but also that somebody found a way to see something though he himself was opposed to it. Because we were all quite sure that if the more radical liberal proposal had gone through it would very likely have fallen on Presbytery level. But this proposal will almost certainly go through.¹ And Albert knew that! And so did his Secunder.

This was a great moment for the church. Our enemies had only been waiting for us to dissolve ourselves or to make bad press again. But that night I didn't get that. I didn't sense that something new had happened, something huge and of historic importance. I was just tired. There was no sense of history or having achieved a great thing. But I slept so well that night and woke up with a great feeling of peace and blessing. And when I saw my fellow commissioners there it was again this deep feeling of blessing. Of unity, I have good friends on both sides of the argument; however, we always avoided even mentioning the issue, too afraid that it might divide us. But when I met my friends and colleagues, my fellow commissioners the following day we smiled at each other and said it so many times: We did it. We did it. We had a real feeling of having been blessed and guarded. That God had watched over us and had shown his grace upon us. He had lifted up his countenance upon us and given us his peace.

We had done it. And what we meant was: We preserved the unity of the Church of Scotland and we can all live with the decision made. We all won. The devil had not succeeded. We are still here and we are standing together against the evils of this world. And that he tried so hard to divide the church shows us which threat he sees in us. What happened on Monday was something like a rebirth of the Church of Scotland – overcoming arguments and splits and division for the greater good and to fulfill her calling.

The Tuesday started with the World Mission Council report. The delegate from the national Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon, Dr. Mary Mikhael, gave an account of the situation in Syria and the refugee camps in the neighbouring countries and the horrifying atrocities that are happening in Syria at the moment. This is just too horrifying for words. We heard how Christians who used to live in peace in Syria were now targeted by radical foreign fighters. These troops were brought in to fight President Assad's troops. They are often radical Muslims or just criminals and they are financed with foreign money. They commit the most horrible crimes. We heard of mass murder, gang rape and crucifixions. I think that each delegate felt like me terribly ashamed of having spent a whole day discussing same sex civil partnerships and the ministry when this is the reality for so many people. But the delegates from that region were so gracious and really engaged with us on our difficult way. And they kept repeating the words the Moderator, the Right Rev E Lorna Hood, quoted in one of her addresses: "Hope is hearing the music of the future and faith is dancing to it."

But it was the Moderator's words on Thursday when she preached on Jeremiah that helped us commissioners to embrace this tension we were experiencing. The tension between our internal problem – which seemed so little in comparison with the problems in the world but which was so huge for us and which needed solving if we wanted to fulfill our calling – and indeed the problems of the world. The Moderator told us the story about Jeremiah who was in prison and whom God told to buy a vineyard. That was a rather mad thing to do because the city was under siege from the Babylonian troops and was about to fall any minute. There was a long exile ahead and Jeremiah was told to buy this vineyard. None of us would buy land outside Damascus at the moment I would presume. But buying this land meant an investment in the future. A sign of the clear and certain hope that there would be a future. And the Moderator told a wee story about somebody who phoned up somebody else in New York on a rather trivial matter just after 9/11. The caller apologized for this but the other person said that getting on with normal business was the best sign of hope he could imagine.

And we did get on with the work that needed doing. Refreshed and inspired by what had happened on Monday. I think it is easier to see the Spirit at work retrospectively. But see his work you could this week. For the Church of Scotland this was a week of grace and blessing and unity and love, of tradition and renewal. It was the week of Pentecost. Amen.

¹ All significant changes to the Kirk's practice which require the passing of an Act by the General Assembly fall under the Barrier Act, which means that it requires the agreement of the majority of Presbyteries. The Assembly passes an Overture first, this goes then to all Presbyteries and if the majority agrees the following year's General Assembly will pass an Act. In the case of this year's decision the Overture will have to be presented to next year's Assembly as there was not sufficient time to prepare such a complex type of legislation, it will then go to the Presbyteries and in case they agree an Act can be passed in the 2015 Assembly.

Our Church – an explanation of the Interior Decoration and Symbolism

Looking upwards in the Church you will see eight shields. This month we will look at the **West Side**. Starting at the end nearest to the gallery there are four shields representing the four Gospels. Traditionally these are represented as:

1. The figure of the **man** symbolises the plainness and simplicity of Mark's Gospel.
2. The **lion** represents Matthew's Gospel because Matthew saw Jesus as the **Lion of Judah**.
3. The **Ox** because Luke saw Jesus in terms of his service and sacrifice for all mankind.
4. And John is represented by the **Eagle** because it is the only living creature that can look straight into the sun and not be dazzled by it. John penetrates into the dazzling and eternal truths that Jesus brings. Those emblems are sometimes distributed differently among the Gospel writers but this is a common allocation. The symbols are derived from the Book of Revelation Ch4 v7.

Elder Bill Stewart

We were all sorry to learn of the death of Elder Bill Stewart after a period of illness on 22 March 2013. Although Bill was not able to attend Church or to take part in any of the activities for some years, nevertheless, he was a well-respected Elder of this congregation for some 25 years, joining the Kirk Session on 17 October 1988 having originally been Ordained as an Elder while a member at Prestonpans.

Bill took an active part in all aspects of worship playing a leading role in the choir as music played a large part in his life. He took that interest into the Sunday School where he taught and played the guitar to the children and on occasions to the congregation always urging those at the back to sing louder. He was often accompanied by David Cooper who shared Bill's interest working with the Sunday School.

He was a faithful District Elder and looked after everyone in his District and the wider Congregation in general. He was a quiet but approachable person and with his knowledge of the building industry Bill often carried out small maintenance projects around the premises mostly without anyone knowing who had carried out a particular task.

Bill became ill some years ago and as a result he and his wife Tonia were unable to attend worship but continued to take an interest on what was going on through visits from members of the congregation. Bill was mentioned by an apology at every Kirk Session meeting, so although he was not present he was always in our minds. Before he became ill he was a regularly attended all Kirk Session and Deacons Court Meetings and supported whatever events were taking place.

Although a quiet man, Bill could, when the situation demanded make a forceful point at either Deacons Court or Kirk Session meetings where he felt strongly about a particular issue and more often than not his thoughts led to a change in direction.

We shall all miss Bill for his support, friendship and especially for the contribution he made to this congregation over the past 25 years. As a Kirk Session we hereby extend our sympathy to his wife, Toni, and all other members of the wider family at this sad time in their lives. We are all the better for knowing Bill.

Bell Ringing

Taking all this into account we have decided to join into what is common practice in most Church of Scotland congregations and ring the bells for a couple of minutes before the main service.

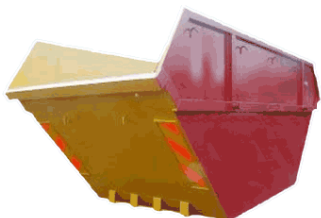
